

The Ballots are Open for State Awards and Hall of Fame Nominations



This year's event kicked off with an athlete meal at the Cathedral of St. Mary's followed by the parade of athletes escorted down Broadway and into the Fargo Civic Center, where various forms of entertainment and the Opening Ceremony patiently waited for their appearance. Powerlifting, aquatics, bocce and unified volleyball, with the help of groups such as NDSU and Fargo Davies student athletes, were held at the Fargo Davies High School facility. The Dickinson Dominators bumped, set and spiked their way to a Gold Medal finish in Division 1. On Saturday, the main event, track and field, was held at Fargo South High School with the help of Fargo Davies student athletes. Athletes ran, threw and jumped to the best of their ability throughout the rain sparse morning and afternoon. Coaches also tried to replicate the skills that they teach by finishing the day off with a coach's relay. Many smiling faces were evident throughout the weekend as athletes were given a fair chance to enjoy a weekend full of activities.

North Dakota Athletes to Represent USA at Special Olympics World Winter Games

Nearly 3,000 athletes and 1,100 coaches from 110 nations will compete at the 2017 Special Olympics World Winter Games in Austria, March 18-24, 2017. Competition and special event venues will be in Graz, Schladming and Ramsau.

Four Special Olympics athletes from North Dakota have been nominated to attend the Games, but will become official members of Special Olympics USA after successfully completing a training camp to be held in Vermont in December. The 2017 Special Olympics World Games USA team is comprised of 150 athletes, 40 coaches and 20 support team members.

The North Dakota athletes nominated are Dave Johs, Bismarck, cross country skiing; Christy Coughlin, Minot and Wade Wintermeyer, Jamestown, snowshoeing; and Katielynn Ovitt, Bottineau, alpine skiing.

Cindy Schopper of Valley City was selected as a snow shoe coach for Special Olympics USA. Cindy's prior coaching experience as a World Winter Games snow shoe coach for Special Olympics USA includes: 2001 in Anchorage, 2005 in Japan and in 2013 in South Korea.

Flag Football Clinic & Demonstration

On June 1st, with the support of the NDSU football student athletes, Special Olympics North Dakota held its very first school based unified flag football activity. Athletes from Fargo Davies, Fargo South and Fargo North high school came out to an evening of drills consisting of throwing, catching, running and "tackling". A short scrimmage concluded the evening activities. On June 8th a demonstration, where athletes and partners were split into their respective teams, was officiated and coached by NDSU student athletes. This is an event that SOND has taken off the pilot program and may be offered as a school based program in the Spring of 2017.

SpartanNash Foundation partners with Special Olympics, raises \$21,500 in statewide fundraising campaign

Dancing for Special Stars


